Tot Lot to Open June 29

The Tot Lot would like to welcome back all returning members and extend a special welcome to all of the new families joining the Field Club! For those of you who are just coming on board, the Tot

Lot is a shady play area behind the pool and Snuggery that, for a small hourly fee, provides supervised childcare for members who are on the Field Club premises. Children between the ages of 1 and 7 are welcome, and infant care may be arranged in advance. Hours are Monday through Thursday, 9 am to 12 noon, beginning June 29 and running through August 27.

This year, the Tot Lot is fortunate to have **Maria Berthaume** as director. Maria has been a lifeguard at the Field Club for the past three summers and has also run the popular Thursday Kids Crafts.

We will be recruiting **helpers** between the ages of 11 and 15 to assist Maria with childcare in the Tot Lot. Helpers assist the director by playing with and reading to children, and bringing children to and from swimming and/or tennis lessons. Tot Lot helpers sign up for one week at a time and are then paid for 12 hours of work. Depending on level of interest, it may be possible to sign up for more than one week. A Tale of Blue Smoothies

Intil just a few years ago, the Field Club Snuggery didn't make enough money to cover its own costs. It never made a profit. From 2002 to 2005, there were steady losses, and in 2004, the Snuggery incurred an \$8,000 loss. The staff produced tuna melts on old broken down equipment. And the kitchen restaurant-style refrigerators and grills began to age... and started to rust and emit odd sounds and give off Hadeslike heat. The kitchen staff began to wilt. Although it was a difficult and expensive undertaking to replace equipment and there was a perpetual operating loss, the Board accepted this fact; the Snuggery continued to operate as a convenience to members.

It became obvious that expensive restaurant equipment would have to be put on the list of capital fund expenditures, along with court lighting and resurfacing. To reduce the operating loss and to allow for Snuggery equipment replacement costs, the Board voted to require every family to spend a minimum of \$25 a year at the Snuggery. Field Club founders had never wanted to institute such a policy, but it looked as though money would be needed to help offset the overhead of running it. It has worked, encouraging most members to at least use up their minimums.

Since it first opened, the Field Club had subcontracted Snuggery operations to professional food service firms that provided the Club with wholesale food prices, ordered the food, figured out the pricing and employed a staff person to run the kitchen. They tallied up the order sheets so the Club's bookkeeper didn't have to decipher them. The service provided a nice convenience for us.

Then, along came some wise members with a Good Idea that has made all the difference. Under the sage direction of **Stew Creelman**, Snuggery Chair; **Bill Monks**, Snuggery Board Liaison; and **Jim Girotti**, Staff Member Extraordinaire, the Board made the decision to stop subcontracting Snuggery services and run the Snuggery itself.

In a conversation with **Eileen Mason**, the longtime food service employee who had been managing the Snuggery for several years, Stew Creelman learned Eileen was doing all the ordering, and she was willing to work for the Field Club and bring her expertise about Snuggery management with her. Since he had crunched the

numbers, Stew was certain the Club could run the Snuggery and, in all likelihood, at a nice profit.

"Under the guidance of Eileen, the Snuggery has turned a profit the last three years," Jim Girotti said. "The profit allowed the Club in 2007 to replace a small blender with an Ultra Gourmet Ice System for frozen lemonade and strawberry." That summer, enthusiastic Snuggery fans lined up for fruit smoothies that, like baby clothes, came in two colors – pink or blue.

The next year, the Snuggery made enough money so the Club could purchase a new refrigerated sandwich unit. It cools 12 open containers under a hood so sandwich ingredients like turkey, ham and potato salad can stay fresh and be easily at hand. Jim recounted the day the original sandwich unit was replaced: "It was very, very old. It probably predated me. When it was being removed from the Snuggery kitchen, its motor crashed to the floor. We all remarked that Eileen was right. It was on its last legs. Because we didn't have to make the sandwich unit a capital expenditure in 2008, we were also able to install lighting on courts nine and ten and take care of pool deck repair. We would have had to wait on those last expenditures without the Snuggery's profit."

According to Bill Monks, "To date, \$4,300 has been used to buy two pieces of equipment; \$10,700 remains for future equipment purchases."

And now, because of the Good Idea engineered by Stew, Bill and Jim, for the first time in the history of the Field Club, here in priority order is the Snuggery's 2009 Wish List. These items will be purchased when the Snuggery's profit can cover them.

- 1. The repairman mentioned we should not call him the next time the **glass-door refrigerator** breaks down, as it would be impossible to fix.
- 2. **Twelve cup automated coffee brewer**, a coveted appliance on those cold mornings after the end-of-summer campouts.
- 3. Panini grill for sandwich extravaganzas

So... the next time you see them, say thank you to our Good Idea people – Stew Creelman, Bill Monks and Jim Girotti – for their excellent business acumen. And when you are in the Snuggery, let Eileen Mason knows she is valued for her astute management.

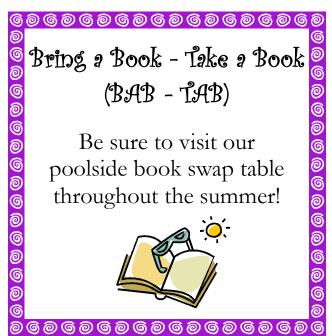
Swimming Lessons

Mike and **Alex** in two straight sets in front of a small, yet vocal crowd.

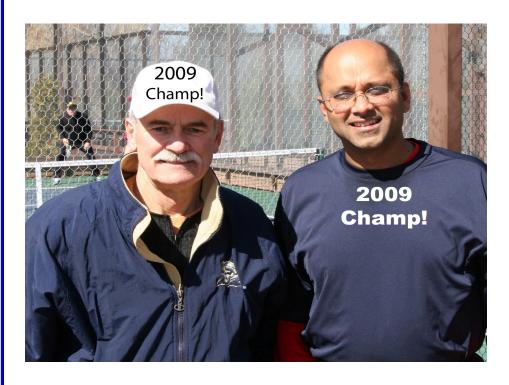
